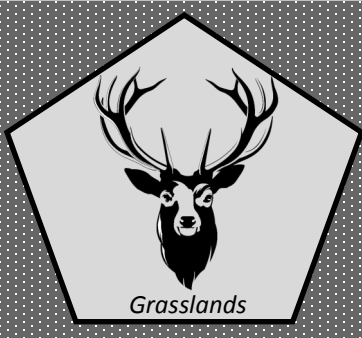
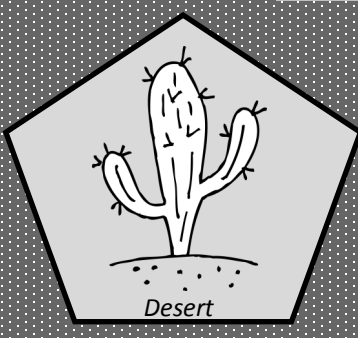
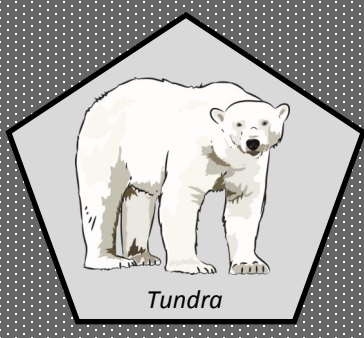

Senior Jordan Brite, who has four years of cheerleading experience, said, "It's going ok so far. I was sick the first game and there were two other girls gone so, I think it

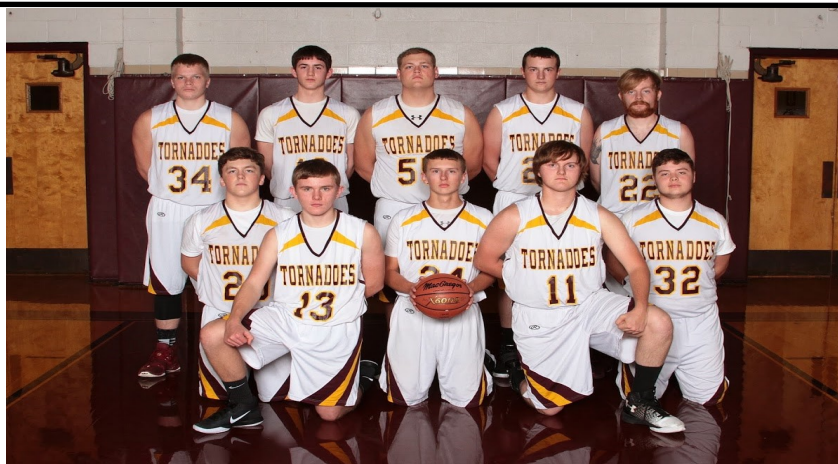
was just working on the absences.

Many people stress over the final exams.

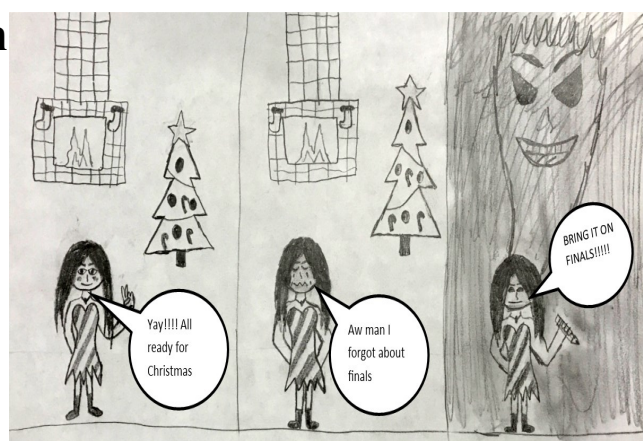
"Preparing for the finals stress me out, all the other information overwhelms me a lot," said Brown.
