It was hard for Kloeckner to leave home.


"I miss my family and the food because the food is really different here." said Kloeckner

Hawley said Griggsville Perry is different from other

"Every school has its own culture," Hawley said. "Some schools are known for their academics, some are known for their athletics, some are really student centered, and some are really content centered. It just depends on the school.

Hawley explained his goals for the school involved both academics and community.

"I want to make this a place where students want to come to school," Hawley said. "We are going to do the best we can with what we have and [I want us to] be reaching for something maybe a little bit higher."

This is Hawley's 32nd year in education. Before he came to Griggsville Perry he was a high school English teacher for 17 years. He taught at the college level as well in John Wood Community College. The subjects he taught at the college level included, English composition and speech. He coached basketball, baseball and softball both in junior highs and high schools. He has three children and just got a new granddaughter in the past month.
