OPINION: New Attendance Policy Provides Needed Improvements

As a new semester starts there are always a few things that need to be changed in the classrooms and the policies. This semester there is a new updated attendance policy.

The updated policy states: Students are allowed 5 day/occurrences of absence per year which illness can be excused with a parent phone call and/or note. If a student reaches five parent contact absences (a partial day occurrence or full day occurrence will both be counted for the purposes of personal illness/parent contact days as 1 day of absence), all subsequent absences will be considered as unexcused.

If a student is sent home by the District Nurse/School, the absence will not be counted towards the 5 days of parent excusals.

Absences which are medically excused will not be counted

toward attendance limits if the parents/legal guardians provide the school with a written doctor's excuse signed by the doctor or nurse practitioner within 48 hours of the student's return (weekend days excluded), which lists the date(s) in question. Absences for doctor visits for parents, siblings or other relatives will be unexcused unless prior approve from

building administrator is received.

A student is considered tardy after the 8:30 a.m. bell rings. All tardy students must report to the office for an admittance slip. 5 start of the day tardies will result in one unexcused absence day (this day will only be counted towards truancy counts).

This policy can either get students to come to school on time or the students will just give up.

Now the people that disagree with this policy will have other things to say. This policy will be helpful in the long run. The policy is very reasonable that you are allowed five days per year with illness can be excused. The policy is going to allow the students that tend to skip school more often realize that their education is important. And that there will be consequences if they do not to up to school.

say that it isn't fair to the students that have a doctors appointment. But those that do not have that problem and just do not show up this is a good way to get there consequences. Those that disagree will have their own opinion on what the new policy has to say.
