



When asked how he thinks the in his team, on or off team will do in these final games, he said "I think the team will continue to grow together and try their hardest. I believe we will continue work as a team, and to play our hardest and we put our hearts into best ability."

Shoemakers says their best achievement yet was when PGP played against Maroa Forsyth. "We held our own 6-0 until the last few minutes of the second quarter. Even though we lost, we held our own and showed a team that is way bigger than us and who looked past us as not even supposed to be there. Though we are small in
